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

## For Such a Time as This



Dear Beloved Sisters and Brothers,

I asked some of our leaders to share with us in this newsletter how they are coping right now, thoughts on ministry and faith and feelings. The most important thing in the world right now is to know we are not alone and that we are in this together physically, emotionally and spiritually

We are very much living in a different world than most of us could have imagined only a month ago. We pray for those effected by the Coronavirus pandemic directly and indirectly. We are thankful when health is good.

We've become attuned to how much we need human contact in one form or another. We are amazed by the interconnectedness of our society – healthcare, economy, unemployment, cash flow, security, the poor, and the experience of worship and fellowship.

Most of all, everything is counterintuitive right now. The best way to protect our neighbor is to stay home. The best way to worship is by social media. Holy Week and Easter are best celebrated without fanfare because that is not possible at least in the way we have known.

Yet, we are not the first. The earliest Christians in Rome met in private homes and during the period of persecution I imagine even these were few. There they met one another in ways foreign to us until recently – no large gathering, no church building and living in a kind of social exile, isolated from one another while closer than ever in faith.

One of my favorite Bible stories is in the Book of Esther. Esther must speak to a foreign king for her people. She will likely be killed, and she does not want to do it. But her uncle Moredcai says she must, to save her people even at the cost of her own life "And who knows whether you have not come to the kingdom for such a time as this?"

This is our time to gather closer to Jesus precisely because we cannot gather except virtually.

Who knows whether we have not come for such a time as this? ---

To understand the Maundy Thursday foot washing as a call to love our neighbor in Jesus; this year, to simply reflect on the visual memory within.

To let the darkness of Good Friday night roll into our hearts, closer to the One who is ultimately *alone* on the cross, without hymns or candlelight?

To Easter without trumpets but instead the rising Easter sun, the hope of the Resurrection that springs in these our "stay in place" catacombs?

Of course, we will continue to connect as best we can. I invite you especially with other Lutheran churches to tune in on Facebook and online to our Bishop's worship leadership in Holy Week (<u>www.mnys.org</u>) and elsewhere. Also, our messages, emails, Facebook, and website. I encourage you to keep connected by phone and email. Letters in the mail are still tried and true and low-tech.

I am with you. Through it all, we are together in Christ, battling isolation, fears, loneliness, anxiety, depression and perhaps illness too. We are also met though with a sure and certain hope, a peace that the world cannot give and joy that is everlasting. In all things we are in Jesus Christ, crucified and risen, who bears us up in hope for better days and the Better Day of the Kingdom.

Who knows whether Christ has not come to his people, for such a time as this? Who knows whether you have not come to this day, for such a time as this?

We hope you are coping in these difficult times. Let us know if you need help with groceries, picking up medications or just a phone call to reconnect. Call the church office and leave a message or email <u>Elizabeth.lizzieb718@gmail.com</u>. We will see how we can reach out to you.

Our neighbor, HOPE Community Services, really needs our help too. At the time of writing it is the only soup kitchen and food pantry open in New Rochelle. It urgently needs cereal, cans of beans, fruit



and vegetables . The food pantry has extended its hours and is now supplying 800 bags, double the "normal" amount each week. Please help if you are able.

The easiest way to help is to go to

hopecommunityservices.org website and donate money. If you prefer and are able to drive to their premises you may leave your food donations at the door between 11 am and 1 pm. A map of their food pantry is given on their website. However, no one over the age of 60 is

allowed in the building so the National Guard is helping volunteers to receive food donations and to distribute meals and food bags to the elderly of New Rochelle. For further information call Ellen Berman at 914 834 8189.

St. Luke's Social Ministry, was able to assemble the monthly meals for HOPE in March and supplied its Soup Kitchen which is now doing take-out meals only.

On another note, we are all disappointed that our Migrant and Refugee Sunday had to be postponed and look forward to hearing Amy Robertson speak in the future. Our thanks to everyone who placed a push pin in the Map of the World. What a powerful image that was showing us where our families originated. ### UPDATE FROM THE ALTAR GUILD


