

We need to tend to our souls. Never is faith so needed as now — "Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen." (Hebrews 11:1)

I have lived in places far enough from the city, that the lights did not obscure the many stars at night. One of the early stages of growing faith in my life came from looking up at the star tossed night sky and feeling the immensity of God. We are so small and God, like the heavens, is so great. It keeps things in perspective.

One of the great adjustments coming to live in New Rochelle is that the city lights reflect and obscure that same night sky. On a clear evening it looks like a mere dozen stars. It gives the impression that we humans are in charge and much greater than the heavens. Without immensity and grandeur, it feels like we are on our own, although the moon offers some distant comfort.

Recently I had a bit of epiphany – although the myriad stars are not visible, THEY ARE ALL THERE, out of eyesight. They are all there, sparkling and filling the sky, "looking down upon us". In the words of the Gerard Manley Hopkins poem "God's Grandeur"-

And for all this, nature is never spent;
There lives the dearest freshness deep down things;
And though the last lights off the black West went
Oh, morning, at the brown brink eastward, springs —
Because the Holy Ghost over the bent
World broods with warm breast and with ah! bright wings.

This is a comfort and a natural example of how faith is "the evidence of things not seen". Just as the roots of a large neighborhood tree reach down and out into the earth, hidden from our eyes, so our faith has deep roots that we are not always aware of and God is alive and near even though our vision is often obscured by many things.

We need to return time and again to Jesus Christ and nature's reminders. The grandeur of God is very near. The presence of Jesus Christ and the Good News must be turned to again and again. God's Holy Spirit is with us in the living of *these* days. THEY ARE ALL HERE, as sure as the stars in the heavens.

FOOD DRIVE FOR HOPE



Our Food Drive for Hope Community Services was Sunday, October 25th. We were set up for an easy, safe, drive through drop off.

Our goal was to collect 500 non-perishable food items on that day.

This year's Fall Food Drive was a first for St Luke's as it took place in the church parking lot. The goal on Sunday October 25 was to collect 500 non-perishable items between the hours of 11 am and 1 pm with people driving up and dropping off their donations. Popular

items included peanut butter, cans of tuna, chicken, beans, and boxes of cereal.

"Thanks for all your support," said Walter Ritz, Executive director at Hope Community Services. "It's never been more important than it is now."

The Drive was initiated by Pat Damrow from the Fellowship Committee and is part of a Feed the Northeast program run by Thrivent Financial. St. Luke's received a Thrivent Action Team grant to be used for an event held in October to collect 500 food items for a local food pantry. Our thanks to everyone who asked friends and neighbors to contribute and who generously donated to make our goal. Well done! Dawn McEvoy and Susanne Kuligowski promoted the event and Pat and Dawn delivered the items to Hope that Sunday.



St. Luke's hopes to be one of the first 100 completed Thrivent Action Teams in the Northeast to gather 500 items and so qualify for a \$500 check from Thrivent for Hope Community Services.

In addition to the many food items donated by church members for the Hope food pantry drive, 12 cans of tuna fish were donated by the St. Luke's Congregation (with money left from the Hope hot dinner budget) as a token of St. Luke's continuing commitment to hungry families.

If you missed the Food Drive, there is still an opportunity to help the hungry as the Social Ministry committee has applied to the ELCA World Hunger for a Matching Grant. If St. Luke's raises \$500 then the ELCA will match that.

His narrative reveals the war those enslaved waged simply to make lives with the people they loved. Harriet Tubman makes an important and memorable appearance as a key figure in Coates' amazing novel.


We discussed the meaning of family, the importance of memory, the skills of the enslaved, the corrosive effects of slavery, and the need for the resistance of injustice.
