

ful.

Sailing into Christmas and January, there will be times of fear and lament. Our joy will be different too. It would be a mistake to replicate the recent past. We can find new ways however to sail these waters. The main thing is to hang tight in these unfamiliar waters. Change plans. Get to the other end safe as we can. It will be worth it. Patience.

As the infant Moses was sent in a small basket "boat" down the river Nile to eventually free and save his people, so the manger of Jesus Christ is a boat sent by God, carrying the child Jesus to save and redeem the whole world.

Our captain has come to get us safely home, to God's kingdom on earth and in heaven. "Come Christians, follow where our captain trod," we've often sung in the hymn "Lift High the Cross".

We are all in unknown waters right now. Let's do our best as the crew to get each other and others safely home. It's what captains do. It's what love does.

When we worship this Christmas Eve online at 8 p.m., please have a candle (or light) to light as we sing "Silent Night, Holy Night" during the Service of worship/Mass. Have bread and wine (or juice) at hand for when we receive Holy Communion remotely. It will be different this one Christmas and it will be memorable. I suspect we may feel more joy than be "merry"; more depth of love from above and together, safely, so we can be "home" soon.

In the silent night of Christ's birth together, God will bring our boat to shore...Oh! The view! The sky! The stars!

REOPENING COMMITTEE

The "Re-Opening Committee" (Ed O'Garro, Jeremy Harris, Joy Mitchell, Nancy Sigler and Pastor Damrow) are currently meeting briefly each week to evaluate projected weather conditions and current CoVid regulations ahead of each Sunday indoor church service. Because the windows and door remain open during the service for ventilation, severe weather would cause a pause in the indoor service schedule, as would of course, any closure required by governmental health authorities. In recent weeks, between 23 and 38 people have enjoyed taking part in Sunday's modified indoor service. Thus begins Sue Monk Kidd's novel, *The Book Of Longings*, set in Palestine and Egypt in the time of Jesus. Kidd's narrative dwells heavily on the figure of Jesus, but the story belongs to Ana. Ana is not only Jesus's wife, but is a woman with a quest --- that of following her longings in pursuit of the largeness

inside herself. Ana's struggle to realize her passion and potential, while living in a time, place and culture devised to silence her, is inspiring.
